## President's Message

e had a tour to Alamance Community College, Automotive Technology area, on February 22 but then winter intervened. The College was closed on Friday due to snow, so our tour had to

Larry and I went to the 84th Annual AACA Convention in Philadelphia earlier in February. We attended seminars, two banquets and won the 1st Annual Pinewood Derby. The Grand Prize was a Lifetime Membership in AACA. Since we are already Life Members, I announced that my car builder, Rick Holmes, and his wife, Debbie, would get the prize.

Rick told me that he knew how to build fast Derby cars and he does!!! We won every race we were in and our times were under 3 seconds. There were 40 entries and this raised over \$1,000.00, with the money going toward the Capital Campaign for AACA's new Headquarters. At the Convention, there is a business meeting and it was announced that an anonymous donor said that they would match up to \$250,000.00 for everything raised by the end of the Convention. During the meeting, they passed the hat and collected almost \$2,000.00 which became almost \$4,000.00 with the matching funds. They have since extended the time to donate and have the donation matched. Remodeling has started on the building and they hope to have it open by the Hershey Fall Meet in October. Our National group hope that by that time the building will be debt free. AACA is the largest Car Club in the world and the Library not only houses literature for our club but 10 other marked clubs (Manufacturer specific). The Library will have the whole 2nd floor in the Headquarters and will have room to expand.

This year, 2020, is an exciting time for our club. We will need to continue to grow and evolve as a club. We have a great history but we also have a bright future. #### Alternative Fuels – from the rear view mirror!

"The fuel of the future is going to come from fruit like that sumach out by the road, or from apples, weeds, sawdust almost anything. There is fuel in every bit of vegetable matter that can be fermented. There's enough alcohol in one year's yield of an acre of potatoes to drive the machinery necessary to cultivate the fields for a hundred years."

-Henry Ford, New York Times, 1925

"Using alcohol in an ordinary Ford car, we are able to get 15 per cent more power than with the present gasoline, although the mileage covered was not quite so high. However, that is a matter of consumption which can be adjusted and regulated. Where government made its mistake was that it went on the theory that an alcohol of very high proof was needed. It began at 180-proof and went up. We began with 180-proof and went down. We found 160-proof to work better than most any other grade. That combination of spirit and water seems to burn best in a gasoline engine. The raw materials we have used in the laboratories in producing alcohol cheaply are various kinds of grains and vegetable substances. Tests were made with corn and wheat. Then we tried potatoes, grapes, cherries, peaches, currants, strawberries, and many other kinds of small fruits. Carrots, turnips, beets, sugar cane and wood were also used. We also found that the waste from canneries – such as apple peels and cherry pits; the waste from sugar factories and vegetable tops, usually thrown away on the farm, were surprisingly high in alcohol value. One of the best materials we found were cornstalks. These, ground up, mashed and boiled, produced a very high percentage. An acre of cornstalks will produce 100 gallons of alcohol – some cornstalks would produce 50 per cent more. Then the distiller can turn around and sell his waste back to the farmer for cattle food. Nothing has been taken from it but the alcohol – all the nitrogenous matter is still there, to go back to the soil as fertilizer."

Henry may have been just a bit optimistic about the energy content of a year's harvest of potatoes, but he was definitely far sighted enough to imagine what the alternative fuel landscape looks like in the year 2020! I would be remiss if I did not point out that the Model T did not have any rubber parts in the fuel system that the alcohol would deteriorate, leaving the driver stranded by the roadside. And although he seems to have been very familiar with the distillation of spirits, Henry was a lifelong teetotaler!

Back in the day I drove to every car show within a hundred fifty miles (sometimes more) of my home. It did not matter what or who sponsored the show; if there was an early Mustang category I went. My wife will tell you she was often what I call a "car show widow" almost every Saturday. Luckily for me she tolerated it very well though the work was saved for me to do on Sunday...

My collection of car T-shirts is very interesting. One show I attended would put the date for their following year's show on the back of the shirt...a smart move getting the date

out a year in advance. The coolest shirts you could tell someone took their time to design and make sure there was a totally different shirt the next year. These shirts were often snapped up by attendees so fast that if you did not arrive early they would be gone. Some of my shirts look new because they were put up when I got home and never made it out of the stack while others are very well enjoyed and are pretty faded.

My wife often "encourages" me to go through my T-shirts and unceremoniously retire those that have been very well enjoyed...as in full of holes and/or so thin I might as well not even have on a shirt. Somehow when I see those shirts it immediately takes me back in time; remembering the particular event and more importantly the people who were there...some of whom are no longer with us. I really try to comply but more often than not I fail miserably so the whole stack heads back to the closet shelves.... I'm just not ready to let them go...yet.

One day I'm sure someone will go through my T-shirts (and other totally useless stuff I refuse to let go) and decide what gets donated and what heads to the big dumpster in the sky. But for now they will stay, mostly living a quiet life in my closet, but bringing back the memories of times past every time I go through them...again!
