#### Mapping the Future

recently pulled one of my North Carolina maps off the shelf in my office to show a young man where Goldsboro was in relation to his upcoming trip to Washington on the coast of NC. I did not have a current map, so I unfolded my 1952 Esso map... as far as I know, Goldsboro hasn't moved in 60 plus years. Now, this is a map that doesn't show I-40 or I-85 or even I-95! It is interesting to see how our state has developed over the years in its road network.
