A Knob, a Button, My Kingdom for a Button or a Knob???

n the play Richard III by Shakespeare, King Richard has a pretty bad day, fighting for his life in battle after losing his horse; it was a really bad day! Anyway, the other day I felt somewhat like him as my wife and I headed south for another beach adventure. I decided to dial up my favorite 80's station and listen to some tunes but wait, we were in the wife's newer car. Now, this car rides great, handles well (for a about 5000 pounds of machine), and has fairly good acceleration. What it also has is tons of technology. Luckily, I was a passenger because tuning is not so easy. First you spin the selector knob on the console into "entertainment" mode as displayed on the center console. Press the selector and it comes up to a menu displayed on the center display with lots of choices, one being FM.... press the selector knob...again. When you get to FM you can spin the selector knob to the frequency of the station eventually ... press the button down again. If you are lucky the radio will be on the selected frequency. Go back through the menu to get back to whatever screen you want. So, tell me again how I'm supposed to tune the radio when I am solo without taking my eyes off the road to make sure I've selected the right menu pressed the selector knob to finally get to the submenu and tune the radio. Of course, it has lane departure warning so if the car "sees" you wandering while you are trying to tune the radio it shakes the steering wheel to let you know you need to refocus on the road. When travelling my wife is often the driver and I am the systems operator to handle the chores associated with the technology of the car. The GPS in the car is very good IF you set it up before you depart. If there is a change the car's "nanny" will not let you reset the GPS unless you are stopped or going slow. The car does have voice command GPS but I'm not sure what language it speaks; whenever

we try to use it the system tries to send us to Maine or California!! As the Systems Operator I always have my phone GPS at the ready plus it is way more accurate and up to date on road conditions than the car system. Finally, I found out the engine has no dipstick. If you want to know the oil level, you once again must go into the correct menu and then submenu and be within the parameters for the car to check the oil level...no I'm not kidding. My wife's car's owner's manual is 303 pages NOT including the supplements.

In my 66 Mustang the left knob turns the radio off and on and controls the volume. The right button tunes the radio and there are a few black buttons you can preset your favorite stations. If it was a stereo system one of the inner knobs would control the balance...since I have an AM only radio, I'm not sure about the balance deal. For navigation I often have a map...you know one of those paper things depending upon where I'm going. I do have my phone GPS too just in case I need a little nudge. When I drive, I look outside at the road, so I don't wander. To check the oil, I open the hood and check the dipstick... The 1966 Mustang Owner's Manual is 76 pages.

Amazingly there are some vehicle manufacturers that have put back some common knobs and switches. One of the most asked for is radio volume and tuning...shocker. Maybe if the controls were easier to use you would not need a lane departure warning system because a driver might actually have to DRIVE THEIR VEHICLE! I fear that is a concept soon to be lost. I don't plan to lose it anytime soon...especially in the 66.
