November 2023 Treasurer's Report



Silent Spring...Nationals?

efore I begin a big thanks to those who were able to participate in our Scavenger Hunt. The weather wasn't the best, but it stopped raining a few minutes before we started, which was great. The avid adventurers toured some of the more interesting parts of Burlington, Alamance and Guilford County in search of the answers to the questions presented. Some folks told me they did learn some things from the hunt which was the idea all along. We had a few folks join us at the Homeland Creamery in Julian to enjoy ice cream. Elizabeth Coble won the drawing at the end of the hunt. A big thanks to Stearns Ford, David Wescott Buick GMC, Alamance County Historical Museum, Alamance Battle Ground Museum, and Homeland Creamery for their support and cooperation in the Scavenger Hunt! Now on to the topic at hand...

Many of you know I enjoy going to the racetrack. No matter the venue, I enjoy the speed and the thunder of the cars participating in the event. I have often thought about building a track day car for VIR and while the thought about the associated dollar signs keeps that at bay the desire is still there. However, with the rise and rapid progression toward electric vehicles, I wonder how the visits to the tracks might evolve.

If you have never gone to an NHRA race (or any drag race for that matter), you may not understand what "the thunder" actually feels like. In any NHRA race you can walk right up to the pits and watch the crews work preparing their car for the next round. Part of that preparation is test firing the car to make sure everything is good to go. Now keep in mind these cars can have around 11,000 horsepower and they burn nitromethane fuel. When they crank up your insides shake and if you get a good whiff of burning nitro your eyes will burn along with your nose and throat...the crews don't wear full respirators for the "cool look" I can assure you (I have learned to spot when an engine is going to be fired up and to get the ear plugs in quickly, stand a little further back and move upwind away from the fumes). When the cars leave the starting line (especially four-wide in the spring) the grandstands shake as the cars blast down the quarter mile. VIR is no different as you see and hear the cars screaming down the front straightaway and then downshifting heading into turns 1, 2, 3 and accelerating out of turn 4...truly music to my ears.

But how would it be if the cars were electric...would it be the same... I think ABSOLUTELY NOT! I guess I'm just an old guy, but I cannot imagine paying money to listen to the "sound" of an electric "Top Fuel" (maybe Top Volt) dragster or Funny Car going down the quarter mile or a car screaming down that straightaway at VIR...how dull is that? Where is the thunder? I know that electric vehicles are fast, and Ford has built a 1400 horsepower electric powered Mustang drag car that is really, really fast. But will the speed alone keep fans interested...I'm guessing the jury is out on that one. Perhaps as us old dinosaurs move on to green pastures young folks can accept EV racing with its silence on the track. I guess maybe they can feel the thunder if they get too close to that electric powerplant. Only time will tell but I'm really glad that for now, my insides will shake, and my nose will burn from burning nitro, and engines will howl as they turn high RPM at VIR... oh what a feeling!

Take care out there and I'll see you down the road...or the track!



Car of the Month: Herb and Barbara Kluttz' 1956 Ford Thunderbird



n 1960, I went with my Father to his friend's house to help with a project. When we arrived, we had to go into the basement garage, where I saw a 1956 T-Bird. A few years progressed and my father mentioned the owner (his friend) had passed away. I asked the where abouts of the T-Bird, in which my Father informed me the owner willed the car to his Nephew, Jerry Thompson. I went to High School with Jerry, and we drove "fast cars" together when we were young.

The years passed, I got married, had children and the memory of the T-Bird faded in my mind.

Fast-forward to 2006, Jerry's Dad (Mr. Bill) and my aunt started seeing each other at the tender age of 89! The following year I went to my aunts 90th birthday party and Mr. Bill was there. I was talking with him and asked if Jerry still had the T-Bird; he informed me that Jerry still had the car stored in his tractor shed. My next question was, "would he sell it"? To which, Mr. Bill said, "he probably would". I told Mr. Bill to have Jerry call me if he was interested in selling the car. Jerry called me the next day and said he would sell it.

The car needed some TLC but overall was solid and complete. In December 2006 we arrived at a price, and I went back a few days later with a truck, trailer, and money to get the car. The car started and we drove it onto the trailer to transport back home to Burlington. The car sat in my garage for 10 years at which time I told Barbara, "If I am going to restore this car I have to get started because my birthday's are coming faster than they did when I was young".

The project begins, I completely disassembled the car and took the body off the chassis. I put the body on a rotisserie for ease of cleaning and body repairs (which were very minor). I rebuilt a wooden dolly to put the body on when we took it off the rotisserie. I took the chassis to Carolina Chemstrip to be dipped which made it look brand-new. I had the 292 CID bored .060 over and I rebuilt it completely. I had Rick Sorrel rebuild the transmission. The chassis was painted and all new brakes plus suspension was installed. Body was painted by Woody's Body Shop by Kevin Pope. He does excellent work!

After one-year and six-months the car was finally back together, running, driving and stopping! This was a great project that took a long time to complete and "all of my money." However, seeing the completed car is truly remarkable.

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
