John Glenn's 1964 Corvair Monza

don't know very much about cars, but even I was impressed by one I saw at the AACA Grand National at the Charlotte Auto Fair. All of the cars were just beautiful – lots of chrome, brass, stunning paint colors, pristine engines. And then at the far end of the field, kind of by itself, was an unassuming car previously owned by an American Hero. The current owner proudly showed us his restoration book along with a copy of the Certificate of Title issued by the State of Texas when John Glenn sold his 1964 Corvair Monza 2-door convertible to the second owner.



What made this car unusual was that it had Air conditioning. I read that Chevrolet didn't go out of their way to promote the air conditioning option on the Corvair. The 1962 Corvair brochure has no photos of the option and makes only a passing reference to it on the spec page. A/C was available on any two- or four-door model, so long as you opted for a radio which was necessary for mounting the interior panel. In 1962 only 2.5% (about 5000) had air conditioning.

Because the Corvair did not have a radiator or a front engine, they had to be creative on where to install the A/C condenser. It is bolted on with 4 bolts and to service the engine, the bolts had to be removed and the condenser was swung over towards the passenger side and laid on the padded rear fender.

The 5th owner of this car bought it in 2002. He entered it in the 2003 CORSA Convention Concours event where it received the LOWEST score (73.41) amongst all entrants. Fifteen years later in 2017, he did a full-on restoration to return it to "factory-new" condition. At the 2021 Concours event, it received the HIGHEST score of 97.69. It was the sixth owner who showed it at Charlotte.

What was interesting to me was the story of the Mercury 7 astronauts and their cars. Alan Shepard, the first American in space and a longtime Corvette owner, was given a new 1962 Corvette after his suborbital flight on May 5, 1961. Jim Rathmann, the owner of a Chevrolet/Cadillac dealership in Melbourne Florida and a former Indianapolis 500 winner, saw a great publicity opportunity. In coordination with GM, he offered the Mercury astronauts a top-of-the-line car at \$1 per year lease. Four of the 7 astronauts (Shepard, Grisson, Cooper, Slayton) got Corvettes, Schirra had a European sportscar, Carpenter had a blue Shelby Cobra, and John Glenn had his "German-made NSU Prinz with a 2-cylinder engine which produced more noise than power." He wrote in his autobiography that he got a lot of ribbing about this car, so maybe he thought the Corvair was an upgrade.

The other car at the Auto Fair that I thought was interesting was this Kaiser Darrin. It is a beautiful fiberglass bodied convertible two-seater with very unique doors that glide forward inside the front fenders. It was the first fiberglass bodied sports car beating the Chevrolet Corvette to market by just a few weeks. The current owner said his club was lucky enough to purchase all of the remaining material used in the convertible top so he was able to match the color. Everything, and I mean everything on that car, is that color. It is prettier than it looks like in the photo.

Anti-Theft Device?

he other day I was riding around in our '66 Mustang. Everything was going great until my phone rang. So why did things get complicated?

Today's vehicles are a technological wonder. My wife got herself a new Ford Bronco and it is a rolling computer. There is built in navigation, Apple Car Play, Android compatibility, Sirus XM satellite radio, adaptive cruise control, "regular" cruise control, lane-change warning system, Blind Spot warning system, reverse warning system, 360 degree camera, rear camera, and front camera (used for off-roading) plus a bunch of other systems that "talk" to one another constantly providing the driver with the most up to date status of the vehicle including hands free Blue-Tooth interface with her cell phone making hands-free calling a snap! The only thing our BMW X5 had that the Bronco does not have is a heads-



up display. That system displays the speed limit, vehicle speed and if the navigation system is engaged the direction of the next turn and how faraway that turn will be in front of the driver...it is ultra cool! When we bought the Bronco I opted for the extended warranty because of the electronics not the mechanicals.

Now being the "old guy" that I am some folks may think I don't care for those systems and quite frankly, you would be WRONG!! Why in the world would I not use any of those systems which not only enhance the driving experience but add multiple layers of safety. My concern is the young driver who has never driven a vehicle without these "nanny's" and relies more on the technology and not basic driving skills that us older drivers developed because we had too. Most young drivers have never not had access to GPS so when I pull out a paper map I get "the look" of "oh yea that old guy can't use a phone or vehicle GPS…so sad." I guess those folks have never had a GPS send you on a wild goose chase rerouting you or just dying or loosing service.... I've never had a paper map do that...

So, what about one of the greatest anti-theft devices you might already have...what could it possibly be ... ' The Club," chains around you steering wheel, a tracker installed on your vehicle...well it is none of these. It is, in fact, manual transmission. Today there are fewer and fewer vehicles that have an available manual transmission so many drivers do not know how to drive a car with a stick. I saw a Youtube video just today that an automotive expert went to the NASCAR driving experience but since he didn't know how to drive a stick, he could only do the ride-along. So, if you have a manual transmission, you have prevented some potential thieves from stealing your car!

Here's my advice to those who have young soon to be drivers: Turn off the technology and teach your young driver to DRIVE! Go back to the basics like backing up without

a camera, drive for long distances with varied speed limits and turn off the cruise control, parallel park...you know the basics! After the basics are mastered then gradually turn on the tech! Make your young driver a DRIVER who can really DRIVE!

So why did things get complicated in my '66 when the phone rang...well I was approaching a curve that required me to get off the gas, step on the brake, then the press clutch to down shift, then shift to a lower gear, then release the clutch and brake then get back on the gas to accelerate through the turn then off the gas engage the clutch then upshift, then release the clutch while gradually pressing the accelerator pedal to the posted speed limit and of course steer the car throughout...I figured the phone call somehow wasn't a priority right then...something about not dying...
