of changes in the type of options offered to the public in all brands of cars. The introduction of an all-electric Mustang Mach-E is just a continuation in a long history of automotive innovation. But one of the more obscure offerings was a bit too far ahead of the times. Would you believe Ford tested a four wheel drive version of the Mustang in 1965?

Ferguson Research in England (funded by Harry Ferguson of Massey Ferguson tractor fame) had developed the first full-time four wheel drive system for passenger cars, as well as a purely mechanical anti-skid brake system. This setup was used on the Ferguson P99 Formula One racecar in 1961, winning a race at Oulton Park with Stirling Moss as the driver. Ferguson wanted to convince automakers to adopt the sophisticated chassis technology for passenger cars, and someone at Ford evidently noticed. In December, 1964, two identical blue Mustangs, both with A-code 289's and C-4 automatic transmissions were shipped to England for trials. One would remain stock for comparison, and the other would be converted to 4WD.

Although it looked just like any other Mustang except for the twin fender-mounted mirrors, and a bit of extra differential showing under the front, it handled much better on all roads, but especially well on slippery surfaces. The Maxaret ABS system was not as sophisticated as our electronic versions, but they did seem to work. The Ferguson Formula 4WD system used a planetary center differential to give a 37:63 front-to-rear torque split. Clutches allowed the front and rear wheels to turn at different speeds, enabling the 4WD to remain engaged all the time. To allow the system to fit, the Mustang had to be modified a bit, including converting the front suspension from coil springs to torsion bars. Although I'm sure it was one heck of a ride, all of the new equipment and modifications most likely made it too expensive for Ford to seriously entertain putting it into production.

The converted Mustang resides in the Tampa Bay Auto Museum.
